

Maria Loberg


The Aquarium's Coral Biologist Caring for Clams

Meet Maria, a dedicated coral biologist at the Waikīkī Aquarium, whose passion for the ocean, animals, and science led her to pursue a career in marine biology. With a background as an aquarist in California, Maria's current role involves caring for the diverse marine life at Waikīkī Aquarium, with a particular focus on the health and propagation of corals.

Embracing her passion for corals, Maria joined the Waikīkī Aquarium in May of last year. Her primary responsibilities revolve around ensuring the well-being of the facility's animals in the Live Exhibits Department. Maria fragments corals to encourage growth and treats

them with different baths for various issues. Currently, she is caring for the clams donated by the National Aquaculture Center in Kosrae, Micronesia.

When asked about her favorite marine animal, Maria finds it challenging to choose just one. Her affinity lies with the animals she has raised and cared for, such as the Hawaiian cleaner shrimp and cabezon. However, Maria is particularly fond of *Acropora valida*, a coral species known for its stunning mix of blues and purples.

Inspired by the transformative experience of becoming a parent, Vania and her family sought ways to shape their daughter's life positively. This aspiration led her


to prioritize giving back to the community and becoming actively involved in organizations focused on sustainability and conservation.

ANIMAL SPOTLIGHT CLAMS

Introducing the newest addition to the Aquarium's diverse marine family-the Giant Clams! Last year, the **FSM-National Aquaculture Centre** in Kosrae, an island in the Federated States of Micronesia, heard about the passing of the Waikīkī Aquarium's beloved Giant Clam *Tridacna gigas* and felt compelled to help. They generously donated 47 clams of six different giant clam species.

A month after hearing the news of the clams' donation, a Micronesian high school group felt inspired to visit the Waikīkī Aquarium as part of "The Madau Project." This program aims to reconnect Micronesian high school students to their navigational heritage. After observing the diverse array of marine species up close, the students left the Aquarium with a renewed dedication to protecting our oceans.

Today, under the care of Aquarium coral biologist Maria Loberg, the

clams are thriving. Maria ensures their well-being through daily checks of the clams, fishes, and tanks. She observes the animals to ensure they are accounted for and not displaying abnormal behavior. She monitors temperature, water flow, incoming and outgoing lines, and water clarity. Maria also maintains optimal conditions for the clams. When examining the clams, she makes sure they remain open, their mantles display no color changes and are free from parasites and excessive algae.

Clams enjoy a unique diet through their symbiotic partnership with zooxanthellae algae, which find shelter within their tissues. However, to combat invasive parasites and algae, Maria employs physical removal methods. Using forceps, she is able to inspect the clams and remove parasites hiding within their shells, and using tools such as an electric toothbrush, she can scrub

algae from their shells. Maria also performs freshwater dips and uses parasite eating fish on the clams to minimize parasites and algae populations. With these measures, the clams can thrive and continue to grow.

Upon receiving the clams and hosting the delegation from the National Aquaculture Centre, Maria expressed her gratitude for the remarkable donation. This generous gesture highlights the outstanding work and efforts of the Micronesian community. Meeting the CEO/President, Martin Selch, and his family was a wonderful experience. She was delighted to hear that the clams had been successfully reared in Micronesia and helped repopulate the wild clam populations, which have declined due to overharvesting.
